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
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What is this document about?



This Easy Read document is an invitation from the Donald Beasley institute to take part in a study.







Their offices are in Dunedin.



A **study** is looking for answers to a question you have and writing down what you find out.



Research is when you look for a of answers about a subject.

Research is often done by doing a lot of **studies**.





This research is about how people who are part of the disabled community think about:

- their homes
- their families.

What is this research about?



We want to find out how people in the disability community think about:



- home
- family
- the right to have a home
- the right to have a family



- what respecting the right to a home means
- what respecting the right to have a family means.



We will be asking about these things by using Article 23 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.



The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with

Disabilities is a law agreed to by a lot of countries.

It says what governments must do to make sure disabled people get the same rights as everyone else.

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities is also called the **UNCRPD**.



Article 23 is the part of the UNCRPD called: Respect for Home and Family



Article 23 talks about the rights disabled people have to:

- a home
- a family.

About the questionnaire



The questionnaire will take up to **1 hour** to finish.

Anything you tell us as part of the questionnaire is **anonymous**.



Anonymous means that when we write our report we will not use anything that could tell people:

- who you are
- what you said.

The questionnaire has 2 parts.



Part 1 will ask you about your:

- age
- gender



- ethnicity
- disability.



Ethnicity is what culture you are part of like:

- Māori
- Pasifika
- Chinese
- NZ European.





Part 1 of the questionnaire will also ask about your **living situation**.



A **living situation** means what kind of home you live in like if you live:

- in a home you own
- in a rental home
- alone
- with other people
- in residential care.
